You will be assessed on how well you:

- demonstrate an informed understanding of the ideas expressed in the text
- evaluate the text's distinctive language and stylistic qualities
- organise, develop and express ideas using language appropriate to audience, purpose and form

Task description:

Students are to write an 800-900 word essay which responds to the following question:

Analyse how Shakespeare's themes are explored through the characters and situations represented in *Twelfth Night*. In your response, explore at least TWO themes, and make detailed reference to *Twelfth Night*.

Success Criteria:

Students will be deconstructing exemplar essays, as well as discussing possible scaffolds to support essay structure and analysis. Students are encouraged to complete a draft and submit for teacher feedback *no later than Friday 27th June 2025 at 4 pm*. Feedback will be given on only *one* draft.

Submission:

Students will be completing their essay as an in-class task. Students will have the entire lesson to complete the task. Students will identify themselves by student numbers.

Feedback (during and after task completion):

During completion of the task, the classroom teacher will give verbal and written feedback on the draft in the google doc assigned to each student. After task completion, written feedback will be given on the task.

NOTE: This is a compulsory assessment task. You are to make a genuine attempt at the task, and all protocols relating to plagiarism, collusion, and malpractice apply. You are required to complete the task on the above stated date. Failing to do so may result in the awarding of the grade of 0%. If students are unable to complete on the due date, they must provide a doctor's certificate and/or an Illness & Misadventure Form. All assessment submission protocols, found in the Assessment Handbook, will be followed.
