
Looking forward to a productive second half of the term and one where we hope matters COVID can move into the background!


Dear Parents and Carers



VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC CEREMONY

On Monday 15th August Emma Robinson, Josie Strong, Nick Piper and Hudson Thornhill represented Coonabarabran High School at the Victory in the Pacific ceremony held at the memorial at the pool.

Victory in the Pacific Day, also known as VP Day, commemorates the end of the Second World War in the Pacific. The ceremony remembers and gives thanks to Australia's Second World War veterans on this day.

On 15 August 1945, Japan announced their surrender to the Allies, bringing the Second World War to an end. After six years of war and over 45,000 killed in service or as prisoners of war, Australians rejoiced. They

celebrated with church services, gala concerts and parades. Over 200,000 Australians serving overseas began to return home, as well as thousands who had been prisoners of war, reuniting families.

The formal surrender took place on 2 September 1945 aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. General Sir Thomas Blamey represented Australia at the ceremony while a dozen Royal Australian Navy ships were among those gathered in the bay.

Buckley Shield Coonabarabran High v Ashcroft



On a cloudy 16th of August the Coonabarabran High School 14s Rugby League team had their next game against a very large and strong side from Ashcroft

High school, Sydney. The Coona boys had the home ground and crowd advantage which was fantastic to see. The community and peer support helped spur the boys on with amazing cheering and support. The game started and everyone watching was tense and nervous but the boys picked up right where they left off after their previous victory over Narrabeen Sports High School. Dr Coyle is a lecturer at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and, during his visit, presented some workshops for elective Music students. In the first session, Dr Coyle conducted a session on composition with the Year 9/10 Music students and they had the opportunity to work in groups on creating a hook for a song. Year 11 had a 2-hour session on



composition where they also created a song before focusing on HSC composition requirements. their study of Ecosystem Dynamics. During the morning students used a variety of fieldwork techniques to gather data about the distribution and abundance of plants and animals. They also measured non-living factors including soil temperature, aspect, gradient, light intensity and

humidity. After spending a chilly morning in the field students had the opportunity to warm up in the EEC



classroom and enjoy a hot drink with their lunch. After lunch students got their hands dirty analysing the soil collected from the field.

Following the field work, students apply a variety of data analysis techniques to investigate relationships between biotic factors as well as the influence of the non-living environment on the distribution and abundance of organisms.

PUBLIC HEALTH ALERT:

NSW Health has been notified of a probable case of meningococcal disease in a child from the North Coast who attended the 2022 splendour in the Grass festival. This is the third case of meningococcal disease in a person who attended the festival.



Although the disease in uncommon, it can be severe, so we are urging people and their close contacts who attended the event in the North Byron Parklands on 21-24 July to be alert to the symptoms of meningococcal disease and act immediately if they appear.

People can carry meningococcal bacteria in their throats and not have symptoms but pass it to close contacts.

If you suspect symptoms of meningococcal disease, please contact a doctor immediately.

*Not all of the symptoms may be present at once.

So far this year, there have been 17 cases of meningococcal disease reported in NSW. While meningococcal disease in now uncommon thanks to the vaccination, it can occur year round. We tend to see increases in late winter and early spring, with children under 5 and 15 to 25-year-olds at the greatest risk of contracting the disease.

Vaccination is the best way to protect yourself, your loved ones and community from the harmful effects of meningococcal disease.

Under the National Immunisation Program, meningococcal ACWY (Men ACWY) vaccine in provided free for babies at 12 months, adolescents, and people of all ages with certain medical conditions. In NSW, the adolescent dose is delivered through the school vaccination program in Year 10.

As of 1 July 2020, Aboriginal children up to the age of two years, and people with certain medical conditions, can also access free meningococcal B (Men B) vaccine. All children from six weeks of age can have the Men B vaccine to reduce the risk of infection.
